



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The area, including the land for the project, is a valley surrounded by mountains and contains the dry lake known. as Mesquite Lake. A small community known as Sandy Valley is located a few miles to the north, in the State of Nevada. The residential area of Sandy Valley consists. almost entirely of mobile homes and other rather temporary buildings. There is a small airstrip and a commercial syanide leaching mill in the area, which services local mines on a custom-mill basis. Operating mines in the area are generally confined to the mountain areas; but placer". claims are being bulk-sampled in the immediate area, and at least one operator has announced plans to build a mill and to placer mine on claims one mile from the proposed permit land. The area is typical desert land with some cactus, mesquite and sagebrush and sparse grass. The nearby lake area ranges from completely denuded lake bed to small dunes with mostly mesquite bushes. Wild animals include jack rabbit, owls, desert rodents and a few small birds. No rare or unique environmental resources are known to exist in the area, nor is it believed that there are any historical artifacts existing in or near the area.

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
